We welcome two new programs to our repertoire this year: Kinderfest's theatre for young minds opens the performing arts to our youngest citizens, while the Resonance Choir is dedicated to the joy of singing for children of all abilities.

CKA is now nineteen years old. While we have come a long way, this year also feels like a new beginning, as we pursue our mission with renewed vigor. We continue to discover how to more fully enrich lives through creative arts activities, and further activate access to the arts for all. This is a big vision. Chairperson's Report

Culture for Kids in the Arts made large gains in 2017 and 2018, in three fundamental areas: in providing outstanding programming for children and youth, in increased public awareness of the importance of CKA and in securing community partners for CKA.

In 2017, Hamilton's Charter of Rights of Children and Youth were brought to life for Canada's 150th anniversary through a partnership with the Pen Pal project that saw children across Canada exchange postcards with over 150 notable Canadians. The I Have a Right project culminated in the opening of a large-scale media arts mural and exhibit at the Art Gallery of Hamilton.

CKA's After School Arts Program provided art education workshops led by artists to over 500 children during the school year and Artasia finalized the launch of "glocal", a 3-year CKA program vision aiming to connect children from indigenous and international communities starting in 2018. This project has a focus on digital tools and in 2018 provided an opportunity for children to engage in creating collage works that were translated into a virtual story box and exhibited at Supercrawl in September 2018.

The Board was also able to see the recruitment of new Board Members with various professional backgrounds and skill sets that elevated the caliber of the group.

The Board's fundamental goal for CKA is to be best in its class in arts programming. This was further done with ongoing programs such as Kinderfest, the Resonance Choir and Art Works.

CKA delivers **year-round** impact via sustainable arts programs for children and youth.



Core programs

Artasia

Artasia 2018 marks the start of "glocal", a 3-year CKA program vision aiming to connect children from neighbourhoods around the world through art and technology.

Led by a team of Artist Apprentices, children engaged in ideation and creation, using tactile materials (especially found objects) to form collage works, but also collaborate with digital tools, including handheld tablets. Artasia culminated with an augmented reality app developed at McMaster University by a research team led by Dr. David Harris Smith.

These tools encouraged children to comfortably and constructively navigate both tactile and virtual spaces to build a "story box": a 3D interpretation of their neighbourhood, augmented according to their own vision.

After School Arts Program

CKA's anchor After School Arts Program (ASAP) facilitated quality arts activities for over 600 children in collaboration with youth service agency partners in over twenty sites across the region.

ASAP engages children and youth at crucial times when parents are at work, and connects with young people ripe for activities unique to the after school environment.

We are proud that we can contribute these services in neighbourhoods over multiple regions, and we look forward to developing deeper engagement with current and new partners in the youth and health services sectors.

Artworks

ArtWorks supported an unprecedented number of Artist Apprentices in 2018. Ten post-secondary students from varying arts and culture programs were contracted to work directly with practicing artists and artist educators, who provided training and guidance as these students put their knowledge into practice.

ArtWorks offers an opportunity for young people interested in building the new creative economy to gain aesthetic, artistic, and practical skills to further apply their creative energy in the workplace.

Arts For All

Arts For All delivered its Why Arts Education Matters programming in 2018, internally as well as to community partners, including Mohawk College, the Boys and Girls Club of Hamilton, YMCA of Hamilton Burlington and Brantford, and the Hamilton-Wentworth District School Board. Of special note in this year, our work with preservice educators expanded, to enable broader understanding of the impact of arts. CKA is proud to support the healthy development of children and youth, and to offer resources for shared learning and growth.

Among these resources, CKA continues to develop tools that empower artists and educators as they work in diverse spaces and communities. Our evaluation and reporting mechanisms help staff to feel ready to implement and facilitate arts programming. Being "arts ready" means that the people who work on the ground with children and youth everyday are informed about the importance of arts, and prepared to work with us towards building positive environments.



Emerging programs



Resonance Choir

In partnership with the Hamilton Community Foundation and Ron Joyce Children's Health Centre, we launched a sonorous new project. The Resonance Choir established a link between arts and health and brought families and health care professionals to the choral celebration by inspiring children and youth with long term health challenges.

Kinderfest

CKA presented an array of shows from Germany, South Africa, France, and Quebec at Kinderfest, a professional performing arts festival for the very young and young at heart. This intimate multi-arts festival supports the emotional and intellectual development of children ages 0 – 6 with aesthetically rich performances designed to captivate and stimulate young minds.
